

DETERMINERS

1. The dog is a faithful animal.
2. Every girl has a mobile set.
3. Both books are out of the library.
4. There were a large number of girls there.
5. Two third of the land was cultivated.

Types:

1. Articles: a, an, the
2. Possessive Adjective: my, your, our, his, her, its, their
3. Demonstrative Adjectives: this, that, these, those etc.
4. Adjective of number and quantity:
 - (i) one, two, three, four, five...etc.
 - (ii) first, second, third, fourth, fifth...etc.
 - (iii) double, twice, thrice, four times...etc.
 - (iv) one third ($1/3$), two fifths ($2/5$)...etc.
 - (v) all, many, next, little, both, any, other, the little, half, several, few, much, some, most, a few, whole, more, no, the few, enough, less, last, little.
5. Distributive Adjectives: each, every, either, neither.
6. Interrogative Adjectives: what, which, whose.
7. Some phrases denoting quantity and number:

Plenty of, a large number of, a small amount of, a lot of, a great deal of, a large amount of, lots of, a good deal of.

1. Some cows are gentle.
2. Some are gentle.
3. These books are useful.
4. These are useful.
5. Either way is safe.
6. Either of the ways is safe.
7. Which book is yours?
8. Which is yours?
9. All the boys were present.

On the basis of use. There are three kinds of determiners

1. Pre-determiners
2. Central Determiners
3. Post Determiners.

1. Pre-determiners: All, both, half, double, twice. one, third... etc, what, such... etc are called pre-determiners

2. Central Determiners: A, An, the, this, that, these, thou my, your, his... etc; Interrogative Adjectives what, which whose, some, any, no, every, each, either, neither, enough and much are called central determiners.

3. Post Determiners: One, two, three... etc, first, second third... etc; next, last, other... etc: many, few, little, several more... etc (qualifiers), are called post determiners
