Critical Analysis

The story also brings out the themes of aging and loneliness, as the grandmother becomes increasingly isolated with time, yet continues to embody unconditional love and silent sacrifice. Her deep spiritual devotion underscores a life guided by faith rather than material pursuits, while her calm acceptance of death elevates the narrative to a philosophical level, suggesting death as a peaceful culmination of a virtuous life. The symbolic presence of the sparrows at the end reinforces the sanctity of her existence and mourning, while the narrator's reflective tone adds a layer of nostalgia and reverence, ultimately making the story a sensitive meditation on loss, values, and the inevitable passage of time.

Short Questions

1. Examine the role of modern education in shaping the narrator’s changing relationship with his grandmother.
2. Evaluate the symbolic meaning of the sparrows in highlighting the theme of loss and peace.
3. Why was it hard for the narrator to believe that his grandmother was once young and pretty?
4. *“She did not pray.”* Analyse the significance of this break in routine in the context of her approaching death.
5. *“She accepted her seclusion with resignation.”* Analyse this situation in the context of aging and emotional isolation.
