Sample Questions

2. Why does the poet consider ice as powerful as fire in destroying the world?

Though less dramatic, ice symbolizes hatred and indifference, which slowly damage human bonds. The poet believes such cold emotions are equally destructive as fiery desires, as they quietly erode compassion and can lead to the downfall of humanity.
